What is an ANAGRAM?

Do you know what an **ANAGRAM** is?

An **ANAGRAM** [ánnə gram], according to the Encarta Dictionary, is a "word or phrase that contains all the letters of another word or phrase in a different order." In other words, you take the letters from the word and put them in a different order to make one or more new words. You use up all the letters, but you don't add any new ones. For example the word "ASTRONOMERS" is an anagram of the phrase "NO MORE STARS".

Here we have some other examples of anagrams:

GOD = DOG

CINEMA = ICEMAN

ASTRONOMER = MOON

STARER

DEBIT CARD = BAD CREDIT

SCHOOLMASTER = THE CLASSROOM

HALLEY'S COMET = SHALL YET COME

PUNISHMENT = NINE THUMPS

Can you think about some other anagrams?

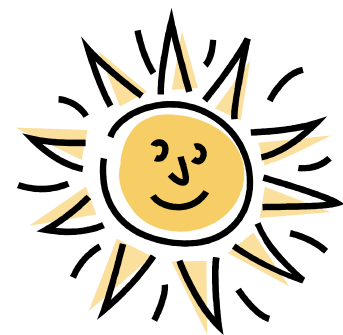

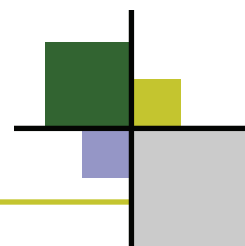

Nouns and Verbs

Words are the tools of communication. The more we know about how words work, the better we will understand what we read and how to write.

Some tutors have asked for information about nouns and verbs, so here is a quick look at these two parts of speech. (By the way, there are 8 parts of speech. The other 6 are: pronouns, adjectives, adverbs, prepositions, conjunctions and interjections.)

Everything that we see or talk about must have a name. Those are nouns.

Nouns can be a **person**, **place** or **thing**. Here are some examples:

- Person could be a soldier, Jane, friend, Canadian
- Animals such as ant, mouse, horse, aardvark
- Places can be: home, Brandon, camp, factory, etc.
- Objects could be a desk, picture, computer, hammock
- Substances such as iron, air, water, food, fire
- Qualities could be kindness, heroism, beauty, faith, etc.
- Measures: year, centimeter, day, gram

Verbs tell what someone or something **does**, or what someone or something **is**.

Every sentence must have a verb.

Some common action verbs are: go, walk, drink, play, start, finish, buy, have, talk, fix, study, try, learn, run, look, move, hear, etc. Other verbs are linking verbs. Remember the famous line from Shakespeare, "to be or not to be"? "To be" is the linking verb. Other forms of this verb are: am, is, are, was, were, been, being, etc.

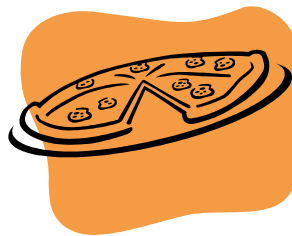

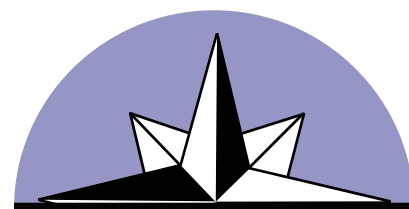

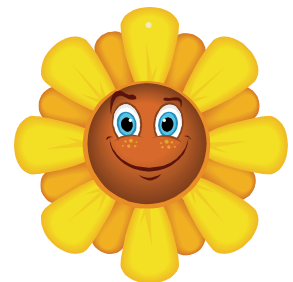
